VICAR'S REPORT

From November 2022

Since my arrival in November, I have been touched by the kindness and welcome shown to me by members of the congregations and the wider parishes. It has been a joy to get to know each of the congregations and to celebrate their uniqueness and the things they share in common; to learn the stories of these worshipping communities; and to see where God is working in our churches.

Following a lovely induction service in which so many of you were involved in so many ways, it was good to stand with you to remember those from these communities who had given their lives in conflict on Remembrance Sunday.

Advent and Christmas saw a welcome influx of visitors to our churches: both church schools were able to have their Christmas services in St Michaels: the first time this could happen since COVID. This year South Ascot Village School (not a church school) also came to All Souls for theirs, the first service which that school had had in church the church for many years. Nicola Shaw, in particular, should be congratulated for nurturing that connection.

Sarah's 'Advent Window Trail' around South Ascot worked really well as a maiden event, involving many of the local community and businesses, and the return of the Christmas Concert at St Michael's was a great success: thanks to everyone who was involved, particularly Amelia and Cliffe for organising it.

The services over Christmas at both churches all went well with generally positive feedback. Attendance numbers were up on recent years, although it is difficult to assess this well due to the effect of the pandemic in previous years.

Thank you to all those of you who have reached out with offers of help, hospitality and shared wisdom over the past few months to make me feel welcome and help me settle in to my new role here. I want to pay particular tribute to the ministry team and the church wardens for their unfailing support and encouragement, and particularly to Sarah, whose support and wisdom during this period of transition has been invaluable and whom I am blessed to have as a colleague. I extend my thanks to all of you who did so much during the interregnum to ensure that the parish and our churches continued to flourish and share the Good News of God with our local community.

Churchwarden Report 2023

We went into the Church year in an interregnum, having said farewell to Stephen Johnson in the summer of 2021. The process of appointing a new vicar was new to us all but, with the support of the parish's Ministry team, the PCC and the congregation we finalized our Parish profile and advertised our vacancy. Producing the profile involved contributions from across the parish and the interview day (in nearly 40 degrees centigrade) involved a great deal of work for many of our congregation and for this we remain very thankful. In June 2022 we were able to announce the appointment of our new incumbent, Rev Tansley Jordan.

During the interregnum, the burden of providing services across two churches fell to our ministry team, who took on the challenge with grace and enthusiasm. As a result, we scarcely missed a beat in terms of full provision of services and continued to build our congregations, especially at the 0915 service at St Michael's. Our grateful thanks should be noted to the team for taking this on. It was also an opportunity to have some members of the wider Deanery ministry team come and lead services and we are most grateful too for their support.

Following the joyful celebration of her 70th year in reign, we very sadly lost our monarch, Queen Elizabeth II, during the year. The sense of loss was felt across the world as well as locally. It was an opportunity for us to pull together in sadness but also to celebrate a life of selfless service to her country. Being so close to Windsor and London enabled many of us to mark our respect for her in the way that we felt was best.

During the year, a number of small items of maintenance were undertaken at St Michael's while, at All Souls, a new heating system was installed which has also meant that the church can act as a 'Warm Space' for those who are unable to heat their houses due to the high level of fuel costs. The café has complemented this and remains a convenient and convivial local center for people to meet. Activities in both churches and church halls are returning to

post-covid levels which means that our churches are providing a local focus – as well as some income to support our overheads.

On a brighter note, Tansley arrived in November and was quickly immersed in understanding the parish as well ensuring that we had services over the Christmas period. Attendance numbers were high and the sense of joy was tangible as it was the first year for some time that we could come together free of any restrictions or worries. Our thanks to Tansley for arriving and immersing herself so quickly into these arrangements. Particular thanks go to Sarah Mortimer, our tireless curate, for bringing Tansley up to speed so quickly and supporting her through those busy few weeks.

Arriving in early autumn, we also welcomed St Michael's new Director of Music, Joe Adams. He has been a welcome addition to the team and we are looking forward to building the choir with new members over the coming months. At All Souls, music continues to thrive during the services, led by a dedicated group of singers under the capable direction of our Director of Music, Judith Usher. We have a splendid new digital piano which has been generously donated by a member of the congregation.

Fund-raising remains an important element of ensuring that St Michael's is financially viable. We were lucky enough to receive a major donation to help to cover the massively increased heating costs. Other fund-raising fun included a Jubilee Concert, Christmas concert as well as many smaller events.

All Souls is an important local centre for group activities. These include Chat and Craft, Art Class, Toddler Praise, French, Morning Prayers on Tuesdays and Thursdays and the monthly Parish Lunch. Local Ukrainians also meet for English lessons. The Church Hall and Scout Hut are also venues for varied activities and lessons. The Church is also a Warm Hub centre from 10 am to midday on weekdays.

Looking ahead, the Parish's finances remain challenged. We seem unable to achieve our ambition of meeting our annual overhead through regular giving. This leaves us reliant on generous one-off legacies and donations, for which we must be hugely grateful, but means that our financial position is parlous. At St Michael's, we need to look at an overhaul of the organ as well making it more accessible for people with disabilities. After a couple of tough years from the impact of Covid, All Souls was expected to close its deficit in 2022. However, the tripling of the energy costs to the Church and Hall has taken the finances back to a sizeable deficit. Some grants and very generous donations from members of the Community have helped a lot. We have also been very lucky to be supported by the Fireman's' Trust and the Sunninghill Trust to help with heating costs and the installation of defibrillators at both churches.

Nevertheless, we look forward to the coming year with excitement as we continue on our commitment to grow the church congregations and engage increasingly with the broader community in which we live.

Report from the Interim PCC Secretary

The governance of the Parish is vested in the Parochial Church Council (PCC). Members of the PCC include:

- Ministers licenced in the Parish
- Churchwardens
- Individuals elected to the Deanery Synod not otherwise members of PCC
- Elected Lay Members

There can be up to 15 elected Lay Members of the PCC. Members of the PCC during the year are listed in the Report and Accounts. Of the 15 possible members, 10 sit on the St Michael's Church Team (SMCT) and 5 sit on the All Souls' Church Team (ASCT). Members of the PCC serve for a three-year term unless they stand down earlier. They may stand for a second three-year term after which they must stand down.

The following Lay Members of the PCC have completed three years as a member of the PCC and have offered themselves for re-election:

There are three vacancies on the St Michaels Church Team, and two on the All-Souls Church Team in addition to the two seeking re-election.

9:15 INTERGENERATIONAL SERVICE AT ST MICHAELS

Youth Report 2022-23

We are grateful for the small team of people who are always ready to be called on to help with youth events.

We have a webpage dedicated to our youth provision that carries information about events and there we are trialling a 'What would you like from church?' form to hear from our young people.

We have a youth record for young people who come to any of our events that covers GDPR/Safeguarding/Special Needs. We have risk assessments for any events that take place and permission/sign up. Each event has a leader who is DBS checked and most helpers are DBS checked.

The number of events in 2022 was less than in 2021 due to capacity for running such events during the vacancy. We held a Pancake Party in 2022 and 2023 and around a dozen young people attended these. The 2023 Youth Lent (Sundays @4.30) has had low attendance so we may revisit the best timings of youth activities.

We ran a successful 'It's your move' event for Year 6 going up to secondary school in July 2022 coupled with handing out a Scripture Union resource to support that transition. We were pleased to have a youth panel involved in the interview process for our new vicar also in July 2022.

We ran a pizza and film event at the vicarage in the run up to Christmas 2022 that was less well-attended.

Our vision and hope is to continue to build youth work with a dedicated team of volunteers, developing this from our good connections with top end primary and early secondary school young people.

APCM Report 2023- PARISH MAGAZINE

The Magazine of the Parish of Sunninghill and South Ascot continues to be widely appreciated by its local readership. It is centred on the Church, but aims to foster local community spirit and cohesion and promote a favourable environment for the work of the Church within that community. It is the Parish's principal outreach and always features in the top 10 of the National Parish Magazine Awards competition.

We produce 10 editions of the Magazine each year, with joint issues published for December/January and July/August. The print run is around 3,700 copies per edition, distributed free of charge to homes and businesses throughout the Parish by about 100 volunteers from both churches and great thanks to them! Not all deliverers are churchgoers, an indication of the local support for the Magazine. The equal split of content between pure editorial and Parish and local community notices on the one hand, and advertising on the other, has been maintained.

Claire Woods, our stalwart advertising manager, is very effective in coping with the difficulties of selling advertising space in our current financial climate. Her sterling efforts keep the magazine going, and supplied free of charge to its readers! Additional income will be earned throughout the year by the inclusion of loose-leaf 'flyers'. Limited to a maximum of 3 per edition, these allow local enterprises to promote specific events. Advertising pays for all of the Magazine costs and serves the local community by promoting local businesses and keeping them up to date with events happening in the parish.

Lyndsey and Stewart McNair continue their sterling work in charge of distribution. We have had a few hiccups since we changed our printers to take a price advantage, hiccups with the delivery pattern as they are now coming from darkest Essex rather than Aldershot as they were before. However as a result of the change brokered by Roger Kohn (see below) we are now getting a 64-page magazine for less than the price we paid for 56. Also a shout out to Crispin at All Souls, who does a magnificent job in keeping the delivery volunteers supplied for the South Ascot area.

Roger Kohn remains our artwork man and is responsible for the stunning layout of the magazine that we enjoy every month, and who struggles on a monthly basis to keep down the cost of paper and ink, without sacrificing quality, in a world where costs are rising astronomically all the time.

The excellent magazine that we have is all down to teamwork and I mustn't forget the advertisers and editorial contributors, such as local schools and children's groups that serve to keep us entertained every month.
