

## THE MINISTER'S MESSAGE FIRST WORDS

If you came back from the dead what would be your first words? *'Honey I'm home'; 'What's for dinner?'; 'Who won the match?'* Around 2,000 years ago, in the early morning, on the first day of a new week, in a Jerusalem garden, Jesus Christ rose from the dead. This is the truth that Christian faith hangs on. This is what Christians celebrate on Easter Day the world over. If you want to explore the event in

detail, read the gospel stories in the Bible for

yourself or a book like Lee Strobel's *'The Case for Christ'* – a journalist's investigation of the evidence for Jesus (now also an excellent film).

Rather than explore that history, in this short article I want to reflect instead on Jesus' first two sentences. They were questions he asked Mary Magdalene in that garden. Questions I know he still asks me and I believe he asks us all today.

The first question is - 'Why are you weeping'? (Jn 20:15).

There was much for Mary to be upset about, as there are for us all when we look at the world and the pandemic, when we consider our losses, and when we look honestly at our own hearts

and lives. But if we are standing before the one who has conquered death and who can forgive all our past mistakes and failures, all fears can be put aside and all tears can be wiped away. Please don't misunderstand me, pain and loss is real and feels great, tears are good and often a gift but Mary's tears were those of someone without hope. Standing before her, and us at Easter, is hope personified and in his presence the tears of hopelessness, shame and despair can be wiped away.

Jesus continues 'Who is it that you are looking for?' Mary is confused and bewildered. She doesn't recognise her dear friend, he was supposed to be dead after all. We too, often forget that God is real, living and closer at hand. God's supposed to be dead after all. Hasn't 20th Century atheism or scientific progress or just the busyness of my life done away with him? But our hearts and souls still search and still cry out for meaning and purpose and for someone to fix it, just like Mary's in her pain that first Easter Day.

What is it that you have cried about recently? Do you know the hope that the risen Jesus can bring, even through your tears?

What is it that you are really searching for? Might that be found in Jesus?

Mary's world changed when Jesus spoke her name. He is closer than you think, you might not recognise him straight away but he knows you and is calling you if you can stop and listen. He has the answer to your deepest longing.

One of these questions might just be the first words Jesus is asking you but they won't be the last. Across our Easter services we will be hearing again the words he spoke to his disciples like Mary, and hearing him speak into our lives for 2021. Words of hope, of comfort, of forgiveness and unconditional love. Do join us in person, or online (see page 9).

And may you know the hope of the risen Christ in your heart this Easter.

May God bless you.




From April we will be moving to weekly in person services at both St Michael's and All Souls churches: 9.15am and 10.45am at St Michael's and at 10.30am at All Souls.





### OBITUARY RAB McEWAN 1926-2021

S adly, my father Rab McEwan died in January this year having reached the grand old age of 94. He and my mother Ann moved to Cheapside from Sunningdale in October 1985 into their lovely cottage with the spiral staircase and the pretty courtyard garden. They loved it there.

Rab had recently retired from his life as a Sales Director for an American oil

company and apart from golf and gardening, he and Ann enjoyed local village life. Rab did various community roles – treasurer of the Parochial Church Council, the horticultural society committee; he advised people starting small businesses, he drove elderly people to hospital visits, he was a sidesman at St Michaels and All Angels and they found themselves amongst a very

friendly community, many who remain friends.

Rab was born in Hove, Sussex. He went to school at Sherborne in Dorset. After National Service (which included a trip to Egypt where he met Ann, aged 15), he attained his degree at Trinity Hall, Cambridge. While studying for his degree, he must have played a lot of golf, as he had a very impressive handicap of 4.

After Egypt, Rab and Ann stayed in touch and after 5(!) proposals of marriage, she eventually said yes. They were married in April 1953.

At home, Rab always had 'projects' on the go – he built a conservatory onto the house in Sunningdale, he laid the patio, built a massive pond, a large vegetable garden, a rather unsuccessful foray into homemade wine and beer .... Our family holidays mostly involved a tent or a caravan and lots of British rain. There was a famous time Rab totally re packed the roof rack because it just wasn't right...however, half way down the motorway, two sleeping bags fell off the roof and Ann ran across the motorway to rescue them. Thankfully motorways were quieter in those days.



On another holiday in Wales, we were all in the sailing boat in a strong tidal race trying to get over a sand bank. We missed the correct channel, the boat capsized and everyone was thrown into the sea, Ann ended up under the boat with a rope around her neck. Rab managed to right the boat, get us all back in and find a friendly local who gave us a tow back to the camp site.

We survived.

In his retirement, Rab had more time for golf and was pleased be one of the youngest "old fogies" as he called them. He set up the Seniors section at Sunningdale Golf Club which still going today and played a founding role in a golfing society for students at Oxford and Cambridge - The Divots and Stymies golf society which also still runs today.

Rab was a man of great modesty, he had strong morals. He loved reading, and attempted The Times Crossword most days. He loved wine and food and golf and most of all he and Ann loved entertaining – dinner parties, wedding anniversaries, family lunches and birthdays. I have such fond memories sitting in their lovely garden in Cheapside.

## **THE GIFT OF ADOPTION**

t is hard to believe that there are over 3,000 children waiting to be adopted in the UK, plus many more in foster care. All children should have the security of a stable home and loving family, and I believe that some of us are being called to consider how we can make a difference in this area.

We adopted a 2-year old when we lived in South Africa, without realising the severity of his neglect and needs, so started a journey of discovery and learning about why love

matters, and how important nurturing and security is to the development of children.

It was only when we returned to the UK, and adopted our daughter here, that we were given training, advice and a huge amount of support, that we really

understood the true impact of what we were doing.

I think we always knew we would adopt, and were divinely presented with our first, whilst living in South Africa. We then realised he needed a sibling and adopted once we returned to the UK 14 years ago. We definitely considered a third, but due to our son's special needs, did not feel it would be the right thing to do, so closed that door... or so we thought.

Although both our children begged us to adopt again, we decided that as they were both in senior school, time had lapsed, and we had moved on. We had other plans for our future.

However, during lockdown, completely out of the blue, we had a call asking us to adopt a 7-month old girl! And, the weird thing is, we didn't even have to discuss this; we just felt it was a gift from God, and therefore accepted with open arms.

Although adoption can take up to a year from the initial application, when God is in it, things can move at high speed, and of course, when His will is being done, everything slots into place perfectly.

With our three children we feel we have been blessed more than abundantly; each one was born to be with us, God knows, even before they are born, who is going to raise them, and he may have your name on a vulnerable little one who is just waiting for you to say 'I will!'

I suppose, if we stop and think, there are lots of questions, like, will I love someone



else's child like my own, will they fit in with my family, will I cope, what if they have trauma from the past, etc, etc, which is why we must remember that God never gives us more than we can cope with, He only wants joy for us, He will

equip us and guide us for whatever we do in His name.

It has been such a joy to witness the miraculous way that God has healed our son, and how He has filled our daughter with His spirit, using them to bring us closer to the Lord. Our new little addition is delightful, and further testimony to His provision; we prayed that she would be an easy baby, would sleep through the night, eat well, meet milestones etc, and even though she came to us with a lot of uncertainty around her development, she is a huge example of God's healing miracles.

In the UK there are lots of opportunities to find out more about adoption and fostering, without any commitment, and if your heart is beating a bit faster whilst reading this, or if you are just curious, or thinking about the empty room in your house, I urge you to take the first step, you have nothing to lose – find out for sure, if God is prompting you to adopt or foster.

The day ended with campfire songs from around the world, some old favourites and some new ones for us to learn, followed by a bedtime story.



### IMPORTANT ADVICE FROM RBWM TRADING STANDARDS

Diare silently protecting you? Trading Standards and Environmental Health share different aspects of food law enforcement to ensure customers get the right information and are kept safe.

Environmental Health Officers are responsible for registering food businesses and inspecting them for health and hygiene. You may have seen the star hygiene rating stickers at restaurants and takeaways. It is not a legal requirement to display these, normally those premises with the lower ratings choose not to whilst the higher rated 4- and 5-star premises use them as a marketing tool. Trading Standards ensure that where displayed they are current and correct i.e. not an out of date rating which may no longer be



applicable. A survey conducted by RBWM Trading Standards found that 11 out of 50 premises visited were displaying higher ratings that they were entitled to which was misleading customers.

Lockdown seems to have increased innovative business start-ups from home, utilising Next Door, Facebook, and other social media. This has included home-based food businesses such as cake makers, sweet boxes, treat bags, delivered dinners, create-your-own ice-creams with toppings, cocktail deliveries, and Indian takeaways. For health, hygiene, safety, and fair-trading reasons food businesses are subject to Regulation, and customers should be kept safe and protected from homebased businesses in the same way as with shops and high street restaurants. For anyone considering such a business venture



but unsure of the controls, there is an excellent guide to get you off to a great start:

In the borough we have recently discovered a new shop selling imported sweets and cereals from the USA. Imported food will normally require extra labelling to comply with UK laws. Also, some additives (such as colourings in

sweets that make children hyperactive) are more tightly controlled in the UK than the US. A niche food business such as this should make initial contact with their local trading standards service in order to ensure the imported foods comply with UK laws. In this instance they did not, neither had they registered with Environmental Health as a new food business which is a legal requirement. These raised concerns and we prioritised it for action - on visiting it was noted that the scales being used were not accurate or fit for purpose, the weight indication was not provided to the customer and the majority of the imported food did not have labelling sufficient to comply with UK food labelling law.

Food businesses need to be gearing up for "Natasha's law" at the moment which fully comes into force from 1 October 2021 and will give consumers extra vital information about all the ingredients in a food product, including the allergens involved, in 'pre-packed food

for direct sale'.

All foods that are prepared in cafes, shops or stalls and then pre-packaged by hand for sale will need to comply with Natasha's Law. Following the



tragic death of Natasha Ednan-Laperouse (pictured), the teenager who died after suffering an allergic reaction to a Pret a Manger baguette, the government confirmed stronger laws would be implemented to protect those with allergies and give them greater confidence in the food they buy.

Currently, food prepared on the premises in which it is sold is not

required to display allergen information on the label, meaning allergy sufferers sometimes lack confidence buying food to eat whilst they are out.

Natasha's mother Tanya Ednan-Laperouse said: 'The introduction of Natasha's Law is hugely significant for people with food allergies in this country. It brings greater transparency about what people are buying and eating, lays down new standards for the food companies, and highlights the growing epidemic of food allergies."

We have already worked with the excellent people at Thames Valley Farmers Markets who organise and regulate most of the markets in the area to get information, templates, resources and support to the stall-holders so they can gear up for this change, and we will be getting information out to other small businesses in the area to help them comply during the Spring and Summer.

### PROPOSED CLOSURE OF SUNNINGHILL LIBRARY

Reproduction of the second sec

Sunninghill Reading Room opened in the middle of the 19th century becoming a Trust in 1885. During the Second World War it was used as an overflow dining

room for St Michael's school to accommodate the many children evacuated from London. These children, now elderly, still visit the library and reminisce. In the 1950s twenty households petitioned for better library facilities and in 1958 Berkshire County Council took over the management. Currently the Royal Borough of

Windsor and Maidenhead are responsible for library provision. They completely refurbished the library in 2002 and ensured easy access for disabled readers. Recently further upgrades have provided access to computers, photocopying and other services for the local community.

RBWM states the library is not fit for purpose? They claim it is underused EXCEPT by children coming out of St Michael's school across the road! They propose that current users should visit the Ascot Durning library which is 1.6 miles distant, with the assumption all readers will have their own transport to travel there or use the infrequent bus service. With talk of falling literacy levels, loneliness and more people reading during lockdown the library should be seen as

essential to village life.

First we must ensure the library stays open, even if the hours are reduced, as if it does close it will not open again. We need to increase the numbers using the library and this shouldn't be too

> difficult. We could also use the room for groups, meetings, book clubs etc when the library is closed. Lots of possibilities for such a convenient space in the village.

The borough plans to reduce the opening hours in June and close the library in September.

### **A VIEW FROM THE GARDEN**

appy Easter Readers! Haven't the daffodils been a joyful sight! One of my lovely neighbours came up with the idea for us to plant some daffodil bulbs at the end of our road in a large grassy area in celebration of the friendships we have made as neighbours during the last year; unfortunately there were road works and it was covered in rubble for most of the autumn so I'm sure we will plan to plant some this year, but when I see them it brings this lovely sentiment to mind.

As promised my camellias are now in bloom and looking beautiful. Camellias are suitable for woodland or shaded areas and

acidic soil; you should position them in a sheltered site and avoid early morning sun as buds may be damaged by cold winds and late frosts. They are evergreen shrubs with glossy leaves with shades of white, pink, or red flowers born in the spring. They can become large bushes but you can cut them back right after flowering, the flowers start forming for the next year quite quickly so if you cut back too late you may lose the next vear's flowers.

I'm very pleased with the progress my tomato plant seeds have made; they now have their first true leaves and are growing nicely on a windowsill. I have a couple of

small, raised vegetable beds so I prepared them ready for planting at the beginning of last month, digging in some well-rotted manure, some ashes from my fathers' wood burner and the contents of one of my compost bins.

I've been sorting out my seed packets and putting them in order of planting by month. I've now planted some broad beans (Express) which is the fasted broad bean to crop according to the packet; mangetout; the first sowing of radish (Rainbow Mixed) hoping for some early crops and some carrots (Early Nantes 2) following the instructions on the packets. I've covered them with a clear cloche to protect them from the cold nights we are having and impatiently waiting to see something pop up! I've also sewn some basil and parslev indoors on the windowsill. I love the smell of basil when you brush its leaves and it tastes delicious layered with tomatoes and mozzarella drizzled with extra virgin olive oil.

My husband, Neil is responsible for growing our potatoes, he has bought Vales Sovereign and Arran Pilot; he has laid them out on trays and put on my shed bench waiting for them to chit (grow sprouts); old egg boxes are also very useful for this purpose; once they are an inch or so long

he will start planting. We use tubs or potato bags; he'll fill about quarter of the way and put about 3 seed potatoes in each and then cover with a couple of inches of soil; as they grow he'll add more soil just covering the leaves until he reaches the top. We find this a space saving way of growing potatoes in a small garden and also easier to harvest.

I've also planted some carnation seeds in some modular trays, planting them 1/4" deep

and put in my heated propagator. I'll turn it off and take the lid of as soon as they have germinated which will take 2-4 weeks.

I have a very long laurel hedge in my garden and whilst I have it cut back twice a year it had become very deep; so I've taken the plunge and had it cut back by almost a metre before the birds started nesting; it currently looks very bare and a little sad but I've been assured it will grow back well!



### SUNNINGHILL CHOIR REMEMBERED

he memory is as clear as if it were vesterday. Sitting around a blazing coal fire at our home in Bowden Road in early December 1954. Dad reading a book, Mum knitting, Gran dozing in her armchair, me on a stool in front of the fire listening to a serial on the radio. My older brother, Dave, had returned from choir practice the previous evening with a message from the choir master, Mr Duckett, asking whether his younger brother would like to join the choir. That following evening, in the cosy glow of the fire, Mum broached the subject. I was not particularly interested; I went to church on Sunday mornings with them and did not see any point in moving up to the choir stalls. The radio serial was holding my attention. Them Mum played her trump card, if I went along for one evening to see if I would like it, there could be a box of chocolates in it. If I didn't like it, at least I would have given it a try. Well, bearing in mind that war time sweet rationing had not long finished, that was like winning the lottery. I succumbed.

Now Edwin Duckett had not experienced a blinding epiphany that there was a budding choral prodigy born into the Franklin family. He was a very precise and organised man, and liked an evenly balanced choir in every sense. He had an odd number of boys in the choir and needed an extra boy to give even numbers in the choir stalls. Thus began over sixty years singing in choirs – I was hooked, and have sung in parish choirs, choral societies and chamber choirs ever since.

To be honest, I can't remember much musically of those early days with Mr Duckett. I can remember the ancient musty smelling black cassocks worn with stiff Eton Collars and bows, which were mercifully replaced by blue cassocks and ruffs a little later. The vicar at that time was Rev. Gerald Thursfield, who had a rather high tremulous voice, which reminded us boys of a children's radio programme character Larry the Lamb, so he was henceforth irreverently known as Larry. I can also recall Sergeant Major Jones, a veteran of both Boer and the Great War. He would walk up the aisle with the collection plate, straight as a ram rod, with a moustache heavily waxed to two perfect horizontal points. On Armistice Day he would appear with a chest full of medals. Also remember George Salter, the verger, who was followed by his son Graham in the same role. Graham was later to teach me to ring the bells.

Rev'd Thursfield's time drew to a close shortly after I joined the choir. A lavish farewell was organised at the Cordes Hall, and as the youngest choir boy, I was chosen to present him with a cheque for £134 -2 shillings collected from friends, colleagues and well-wishers (this is equivalent to around £3,500 in 2021 so not an insignificant sum). After a short interregnum, the new Vicar arrived, Rev'd Frederick Vickery. Although a kindly man, he was fairly disorganised, and always looked as if he had overslept and got dressed in a hurry. He was very supportive of the choir, allowing us to play cricket on the Vicarage lawn before choir practice in the summer, and arranging choir outings, one to the seaside at Brighton, and another to see the new musical *Oliver!* in London's west end. This was a real treat, and I fell in love with Georgia Brown playing Nancy! One lasting memory of Fred, as the choir irreverently called him, was of a choir practice on a winter's evening in 1963. Fred rushed into the church part way through choir practice to announce that US President Kennedy had been assassinated and held an impromptu service then sent us all home. He was a bachelor and rattled around in



the big old vicarage. Sadly, he took his own life in later years, and I can recall the sad occasion of his funeral.

Not long after Rev'd Thursfield's retirement Mr Duckett also retired in 1957. A farewell party was held for him in the old Vicarage. The new organist and choirmaster took over, this was Tom Reed. Tom was blind from birth, an excellent organist and accompanist. Despite his disability, he always seemed to know where we all were and what we were up to. As many blind musicians were, and probably still are, they were also trained as piano tuners, Tom supplemented his income by looking after many of the pianos in the village. He lived in the School House in School Road with his wife Amy and son John. He also played the organ for funerals at Woking Crematorium. This required him to make a bus journey with three changes to reach his destination. A journey always taken on his own with incredible confidence. I have a lot to thank Tom for. He always encouraged me in my singing. He would put on recitals and concerts, and one year, probably around 1965, he put on a choir and organ concert, with the main item being Stainer's Crucifixion. He brought in a professional tenor for the solos, and asked me if I would take the Bass solos and duets with the tenor. I accepted with trepidation, but he

coached me all the way and gave me the confidence to carry it off. That was the first of many solo appearances to this day. The most memorable thing of the concert, was that Tom had hired a baby grand piano for one recital item. When rehearsals were over in the evening, I stayed behind to tidy up and prepared to leave. Tom told me to go ahead, he would stay behind and tune the piano. Unthinkingly, I said that as he was staying I would leave the church lights on when I left. Tom grinned and said that it was OK for me to turn them out when I left, which I did. I often wonder what would have happened if someone had come into the darkened church that evening, only to hear the mysterious plink, plink, plonk of a ahostly piano in the darkness!

Following the sad demise of Rev'd Fred Vickery, we welcomed Rev'd Edward Gibbon, a retired RAF Padre. He became a firm family friend. Edward officiated at our wedding and baptised our children. He hosted many lavish garden fetes in the grounds of the Vicarage. He always put a barrel of beer in the garage for the helpers, and insisted that no one could go until it was empty – happy days! The last time I saw him was when he came back for the funerals of Dad in 1990 and Mum in 1992.

In the early days of the choir it was made up of boys and men. Boys



misbehaving in the sermon would often get a substantial pat on the head with a heavy hymn book from Harold Macey in the back row. Adult men in the choir became lifelong friends, particularly Bill Brown and Trevor Lewis, Bill followed me many years later to join the choir of The Royal Memorial Chapel Sandhurst, where he sang right up until he died. Among the boys I am still friends with Harry Macey, who became organist at Holy Trinity Sunningdale and led Egham & District Choral Society for many years, now retired to Norfolk. The inevitable happened in the 1960s, girls, and then women were brought into the choir. I have to say to my great delight, as I found my first steady girlfriend in the choir, and we had many happy years together until, work and college in different parts of the country drifted us apart. I sang in the choir right up until 1972, when I married, moved away and found new choral pastures further afield.

I have returned to help out in the choir for weddings, funerals, memorials and concerts when needed. The most recent was to sing with an octet for a memorial service in 2020. It was an Octet formed by a group of colleagues. The leader of the Octet emailed me asking if I could sing for the service. He said it was a church in Sunninghill and he would send me directions. I jumped at the chance. It was a fairly emotional visit, as it was the first time I had been in the church for a service since my mother's funeral in 1992. However it was good to see the old choir photo from the 1920s in the vestry, which included my Dad as a boy and my Grandad in the back row, also a photo of me in the choir in 1957 at Mr Duckett's retirement with my brother in the back row.

I was baptised, confirmed and married in the church and both our children baptised there. Mum and Dad's ashes are interred right opposite the West door with a plaque to mark the spot, and the Bishop's chair sits in the side Chapel in memory of our Dad. St Michael and all Angels holds a special place in my heart. A choral lifetime started by Cadbury's Milk Tray all those years ago.

### LOCKDOWN YOUTH DJ SET IN ALL SOULS


