THE MINISTER'S MESSAGE

NOT KNOWING WHAT THE FUTURE HOLDS

e are living through the greatest time of uncertainty that many of us can remember. If we're honest, none of us are really sure of what the next week, month or even year will bring. Writing an article in mid-April for a May/June edition of this magazine therefore feels a bit perilous. What will have happened in the meantime? Will we still be in lockdown? Maybe schools will be back, or not? What about the people who may have died?

Like you, I can't see the future and whilst I may have thoughts about what could happen, I'll most likely be a little off the mark. However, there are three things about the future of which I am certain and which sustain me and I hope will help you too.

First, God will be with us. The future Archbishop of York has written that "whilst our church buildings are shut, God goes door to door". That is absolutely true. Whether we are at home alone, on our exercise, struggling round the shops or fretting with our family – God is with us. To talk to in prayer; to hear from through the Bible, words of others and nudges of his Spirit; and to encourage and sustain us with his presence, peace and strength.

Secondly, this will all end. I don't believe things will go back 'to normal', and in many ways I hope they don't. There's a lot that is better and more healthy about our common life now than there was before this outbreak. I speak more to my Mum for example, I spend more quality time with my children, I'm more conscious of nature and I've been reminded how little I need to be content. But this will all end and change will come once more. Let's just keep hold of the good changes

And finally, this life isn't all there is. In fact, it's barely an opening chapter in the great book of life to come. It's right that we protect, save and cherish the life we have (whatever it's quality), but it's helpful and healthy to remember that our life with him continues after death. The resurrection of Jesus, that we celebrated on Easter day, is the proof that all his promises come true. Eternal life with him, and those who have gone before us, in a new heaven and earth gives some context to our present suffering. St Paul shares this thought with the 1st Century Church in Rome:

'I consider that our present sufferings are not worth comparing with the glory that will be revealed in us.' (Romans 8:18)

And so I can live with hope, and grieve with hope and help others with hope for today and tomorrow.

These are just some things that I am sure of and can hold onto whilst everything else is changing. I pray that you, too would know the comfort of God's presence and the assurance of a future with him.

USEFUL ADVICE FROM RBWM TRADING STANDARDS

Royal Borough of Windsor & Maidenhead

COVID-19

s I write this in early April the world has changed quite a bit and by the time you read this it may have changed further. Adapting to this change, Trading Standards have been tasked with enforcing the new Health Protection (Coronavirus, Restrictions) (England) Regulations 2020. These Regulations give Local Authorities (within RBWM it is Trading Standards) and the Police, the power to require the closure of specified businesses (car showrooms/casinos/spas etc). It also requires other shops to close to the public but with an option to trade remotely (telephone orders/online) for delivery to consumers.

We have had a small number of complaints relating to premises which are still open although mostly due to misunderstanding of the guidance as they are premises which are permitted to continue to trade (homeware/hardware stores/ off-licenses). There have also been complaints about general office work continuing. Government is encouraging people to work from home but the legislation does not then cause all non-retail business to grind to a halt. Guidelines have been written to ensure that this is carried out safely. Some businesses are of a hybrid type and have been considered on a case-by-case basis such as garden centres with food or pet shops within them.

We have seen many complaints about pricing. In the main these have been regarding small, independent retailers selling those articles in high demand and low supply for vastly inflated prices. At the time of writing, the Government has not yet implemented pricing legislation which would ban this type of profiteering. The raising of prices is currently not an offence as long as the consumer is made aware of the price before purchase (label/shelf edge). Some traders are justifying these price increases claiming that they are due to increases in wholesale prices with additional delivery charges, logistical costs and removal of

discounts.

Of more concern are the reports of products, such as hand sanitisers and face masks, that are incorrectly labelled, have prohibited substances in them and are not compliant with legislation. Such products may not offer any protection and are making false claims pertaining to Covid-19.

While there have been a lot of altruistic and genuine acts of kindness there have also been a vast array of scams pertaining to Covid-19; from individuals targeting elderly or vulnerable consumers for services such as jet washing and "disinfecting" driveways; to scam texts purporting to impose fines for leaving your home; as well as scam charities suggesting they can help those most in need.

Our advice remains consistent - Stop and take a moment to think before giving anybody your personal details, banking information or cash. Do not allow yourself to be rushed into anything. Challenge – do not assume everybody is genuine but instead ask to see a form of ID and then ensure you check this information. Protect - speak to others, family, friends about the matter and if you believe you may have fallen for a scam report it (to Action Fraud, Trading Standards, your bank).

The Citizens Advice Consumer Helpline (freephone) 0808 223 1133 is available for help and advice and Trading Standards are notified of all enquiries made via this service.

OUT OF THE ASHES...

ight now, close to a third of the world's population is experiencing some form of lockdown. It's on everyone's lips, omnipresent on social media platforms and newspapers, in art, poetry, and songs. "COVID-19" are the four inescapable syllables of 2020.

Undoubtedly, we will have seen the awful news about the rising death toll, the loss of iobs, the lack of normal social interaction. We should take time to grieve loved ones and grieve a normalcy we no longer have.

But COVID-19 has also given us a very significant opportunity: a pause button. A time to reassess how content we truly are. A time for the earth to breathe. A time for it to recover.

According to the *Financial Times*, less coal burning in China in February alone has already avoided the equivalent of the annual emissions of a small European country. The world's largest producer of CO₂ experienced an 18% drop in emissions between February

and March.

Europe has experienced an even greater emissions decline - an estimated 40-60% over recent weeks. Globally, airline CO₂

emissions plummeted 31% in March - the equivalent of taking at least 6 million cars off the road for a year (data from Flightradar24). Even the highly controversial third runway planned for Heathrow has been put on hold. potentially pushed back beyond 2030, as the West London airport reported a 52% slump in passenger numbers in March. This will be their worst month since the 1980s. To top it all off, road traffic in the UK has fallen by 70%, with historically congested roads clear and quiet.

Beyond this potentially being the largest fall in emissions on record - a crucial step in fighting climate breakdown - the reduced traffic and human activity has led to increased health and wellbeing.

THE PEOPLE'S WAR

The Nation should have partied on May 8, just like 75 years ago when it celebrated Victory in Europe, known as VE-Day. Sadly, all commemorations are cancelled.

he news of Germany's final and unconditional surrender had reached Britain a day earlier, picked up from an announcement on German radio transmitted from the post office next to the central police station in the northern city of Flensburg. Flags were already being hung across the streets all over Britain and in our Commonwealth allies who had contributed so much. Houses were adorned with Union Jacks and some with the Hammer and Sickle of Russia, the Allied nation that had suffered the most. Across London, shops were shuttered in readiness for the national holiday the next day when the formal announcement would be made.

On the front lawns in Ascot, large 'V's had been cut and floral displays put in. those displays lovingly tendered in the months to come. In the Caroline Duckett family, Ascot's wartime diarist, the entry recorded that grapefruit was now available in the greengrocer. The Bertram Mills circus had announced it was to return to Ascot, wanting its traditional location returned, upon the news that the 500 PoWs in the detainment camp onsite were to be dispersed elsewhere. The Duckett family had befriended three German PoWs and they had repainted the house in the absence of Caroline's organist husband, Ted, who for three years had been in Baghdad in the war against the Turks. The camp was cleared and the three were sorry to leave Ascot. Before they left, each had signed the autograph book of one of the daughters and written a verse: one would keep in touch with the Duckett family for years. Amongst the many evacuees in the town, some refused to return to London and continued to live with the families who had taken them in. Hazel and her daughter Leslie, the two evacuees in the Duckett home, did return and on their departure, Hazel gave each of the Duckett's four children a prayer book.

At midnight, warships and merchant marine vessels had led the national salute in a cacophony of prolonged deep blasts. In London and in other cities, which had also borne the brunt of the bombing, searchlights flashed out 'V' signs across the sky. The victory celebration had begun.

The new day had started with a fine drizzle but the weather knew better than to spoil this party. It cleared and the sun came out. St Paul's Cathedral in London was packed the entire day. Policemen's helmets were adorned with home-made red, white, and blue rosettes. Lampposts were precariously climbed and the people sang... like they had never sung before, none more so than in London's East End, the area that had experienced so much death and destruction. Tears were shed for the lost.

Soldiers, too, had joined in the throngs trying to forget that demob would soon follow with many facing unemployment and hardship. The ending of war didn't imply an end to rationing, those cards would be used well into the 1950s, as many of us will remember. The scars of a six-year war in Europe would not be guickly healed. At 3pm, the nation did hear Winston Churchill, his speech relayed by loudspeakers outside Parliament and echoing in the packed streets. From several balconies during the day, Churchill's bodyguard would later record that his revered charge had waved 'like a schoolboy on an outing, to the thousands cheering below.

At night, the national party intensified even though the festivities were tempered by the harsh realisation that another war – against Japan- still needed to be won. Public buildings were lit up and as one national newspaper put it, the searchlights 'danced a ballet in the sky'.

In Churchill's stirring broadcast, quite rightly he had paid tribute to the fighting services of the nation and the Commonwealth, but he didn't hold back on thanking the entire British nation. 'This is your victory', he said 'in all our long history we have never seen a greater day than this.' It had been a 'People's War'.



The women of Britain hadn't needed any incentive to work on the farms, to drive the tractors, pitch the hay, and pick the fruit and vegetables. Nor did 16-year-old girls await the call-up to man the hundreds of artillery field units on the East Anglian coast. London's ambulance centre, based in the GLC building on the south side of Westminster Bridge, had no shortage of women volunteers during the London Blitz that had lasted uninterrupted for 100 nights.

Now, just as then, we have become a nation of volunteers but this time to grapple with an unseen enemy. The response to the call for retired doctors and nurses to assist the frontline has been overwhelming.

Ambulance crews and paramedics calmly go about their work despite the great risk to themselves, and the lowly-paid care workers continue to look after our elderly despite the spread in contagion. Pharmacy workers know they provide an essential service, as do the utility workers that keep our essential services – which we take for granted – in running order.

Posties do their rounds and supermarket and food store staffs maintain the shelves, thanks to the delivery drivers. In the fields, the farmers are ensuring a ready supply. Social workers, prison officers, bus, train and Underground drivers, teachers, police, firefighters, refuse collectors, cooks, factory workers, those who bring us the news, and so many others are out there looking after

the nation whilst the rest of us try and come to terms with the oddities and growing banalities of self-isolation, social distancing, and lock-down, three terms now shaping how we live. In the communities, the charities and volunteers staff food-banks, look after the elderly and home-bound, as well as providing a sympathetic ear to the anxious and confused. A lady in South Ascot, with many helpers, is sewing 2,000 'scrubs' for the local hospitals despite the shortage of fabric, polyester lining and funding.

The nation will party again, sometime, and only when it is safe to publically do so. When it does, it will be against a backdrop of a thumping contraction in the economy with drastic reductions in incomes and mass unemployment. Many shops won't reopen, their owners bankrupt. Our methods of communication will most certainly have altered, forever. Business travel will have slimmed, probably making redundant the plan for a third Heathrow runway. Does HS2 really have a future? Above all, we will no longer tolerate the blandishments of politicians whose promises and manifestos have long bordered on fantasy.

We are in a new 'People's War'. Hopefully, there will be a way out just as there was in May 1945. There will come a time when we can formerly thank those who were on the frontline, and the tears will again flow for the



- Any medical need, or to provide care or to help a vulnerable person
- Travelling only where essential which includes to and from work, if you're unable to work from home

These four reasons are exceptions - even when doing these things, you should be minimising time spent outside of the home and ensuring you are two metres apart from anyone outside of your household and washing your hands when you return home.

We understand it can be difficult to know what to do, or not do; this situation does need all of us to take a moment and think about what we're doing and to assess the potential risk. This is a virus that spreads by human physical contact. It's sensible to do everything you can to minimise the amount of physical contact that you have with other people.

We appreciate that the vast majority of people are following the stay at home measures and we're very grateful to them for doing so.

We'd encourage you to continue to follow the measures; we are patrolling and advising people if we see them doing things which are contrary to the government advice. Enforcement is a last resort for us and we'd prefer to work with the public to resolve situations through clear communication and explaining why they might want to behave differently first.

THIS IS OUR HOME NOW

This series of articles is about our neighbours who have moved to this country. Today it is Meher's story. Meher was born in Pakistan, grew up in Saudi Arabia and moved to England in 2005.


y family hail from the foothills of the Himalayas but I was born in Karachi overlooking the Arabian

Sea and grew up in Saudi Arabia. My parent's generation all come from big families, with ten or twelve children, which was normal as many children die. My husband is an only child, and I am one of three. Growing up in Saudi, we were very dependent on my father to go anywhere. Women couldn't drive or go out on their own-but we didn't want to, it was too hot! We didn't feel isolated or restricted, it was just normal. My father sent us to a British school in Saudi. It was really expensive but he worked his fingers to the bone to do it. I loved it there: it felt homely, with small classes. We learned woodwork, cooking and sewing. My father always taught me that if you believe in something, you go for it.

Our marriage was arranged between our families. When they suggested I meet him, I said 'Why would I want to speak to him? Just deal with it!' It took me 3-4 months to decide he was the right person for me- an 'orchestrated' falling in love!

I had no language problems and had been exposed to English culture at school. Saudi would never have been my 'forever' home. The immigration process was very simple. But then I had to do a 'Life in the UK' test for citizenship, and had to swot up! Very stressful! I had to memorize the National Anthem and pledge allegiance to the crown! The Mayor came to give us our certificate, all dressed up for the ceremony! The British heritage resonates with my soul, it's very honouring. Harry and Meghan's wedding made me realize how much I love the UK.

We Moslem women wear the abaya, which is the overdress. In Saudi this had to be black, but now other colours or patterns are allowed as long as they aren't too bright. Underneath we wear ordinary clothes. (Meher shows me her red polka dot dress underneath). In front of men who are not blood relatives we wear the headscarf or hijab. Our hair is considered a woman's most beautiful asset, and we dress up, but only for our husbands. We wear makeup, but don't pluck our eyebrows- unless we have a monobrow! Some headscarves are worn over caps, some are in one



All the Old and New Testaments are there in the Quran. We believe in all of it. It is the same religion. You need to

respect everyone: Atheists, Hindus, Christians, Jews and Buddhists. We teach the children the little stories of Adam and Ibrahim, and the practice of being kind to the poor and all living things. Because you don't hear a tree or an ant talking, it doesn't mean they are not alive. Be respectful. Try not to hurt anyone. People portray Islam as a religion of fighting but the fundamentalists don't really understand the religion. You cannot paint everyone with the same brush. They are misguided and led astray. No religion tells you to kill anything. No religion teaches hate. I stay present in my children's Islamic tutorials, so that I know if they are taught something wrong. As Moslems we can be faced with racism or hatred. We have more stacked against us. I have been racially attacked a few times. Once a woman walked right up to me and said 'You're a brutal murderer.' She just started accusing me. We were so shocked.

While I miss my family in Saudi, this is my home and where I belong. The children love going to Saudi for little holidays, because the grandparents spoil them a bit, and it's hot and they get ice creams!

We believe that the Quran is the word of Allah and that The Angel Gabriel brought a few sentences at a time to Mohammed, which he memorized and passed on to his followers. After my GCSEs I tried to memorize the Quran myself, in Arabic, but didn't complete it, although many people do. It's harder for a woman to do this, as she has more responsibilities with the home and children than a man. Some people recite one of the thirty parts of the Quran every day for thirty days. I can write my names in Arabic; 'Meher' means the gift that a man gives his wife at Nikkah, at the marriage contract, and 'kind and generous' in Urdu. My middle name means 'nightingale's voice'. We try to live up to our names- although I can't sing! I try to bring kindness and thoughtfulness to everything that I do.
