FROM THE EDITOR...

his year marks the 100th anniversary of the Royal British Legion. It was established in May 1921, bringing together four national organisations that had been established after the First World War. By 1921 the tradition of a two-minute silence had already been established and the first ever poppy appeal was also held that year. The money raised (£106,000) was used to help WWI veterans with housing and employment. The Royal Charter was granted in 1925.

Over six million men had served in the war, including my paternal grandfather, 35-year old Frank Cross. Of those who returned (not including my grandfather, sadly), nearly 2 million had suffered some kind of disability and half of those were permanently disabled. During the 2nd World War it was active in Civil Defence, providing officers to the Home Guard. The organisation supports nearly 36,000 war disablement pensions, and is always campaigning for better support for British military personnel resettling into civilian life. Please support those who serve us all in so many ways, both financially and morally by wearing your poppy this November.

Talking of support, please do support our advertisers in this magazine whose generous contributions keep this magazine going through the years. They are our lifeblood!

I'm not sure where we're going with shortages of everything, which to some extent is self-inflicted by our panic buying and hoarding of stuff that usually turns out to be unnecessary! Maybe it will be no bad thing if it serves to dampen our appetites for total over-indulgence at Christmas! The Duke of Cambridge in a recent television programme showed how we unmercifully burden the developing world with our rubbish, so casually tossed away in

uncontained mountains in what was once unspoilt countryside.
Never mind the carbon footprint required to get it there! We certainly need to change our ways – never mind haranguing governments, although that is needed, we need to start with ourselves and change the way we live.



POETRY CORNER

uring the summer, a reader of this magazine contacted me regarding the poem "Gray's Elegy written in a Country Churchyard." He had been volunteering to transport patients to and from Wexham Park hospital, and had discovered St Giles Church, Stoke Poges and the adjacent Memorial Garden during a break.

Thomas Gray lived between 1716 and 1771. He was a professor at Pembroke College, Cambridge. He is buried in St Giles' churchyard, and although disputed, it is generally believed he wrote the poem there. He was the founder of the so called "Graveyard" school of poets, primarily due to the Elegy.

The theme of the poem is that death renders all humans equal, no matter their respective roles in life. Indeed, the funeral service in the Church of England is the same whether you are commoner or royalty. Only the choice of hymns, readings, music etc.

The poem is very solemn and sombre. The first, very well-known lines set the mood, "The curfew tolls the knell of parting day, the lowing herd wind slowly o'er the lea". The verses that follow express the things the dead will no longer be able to do, from mundane things like ploughing, harvesting, coming home to the family etc, the life of a poorer man. Subsequent verses explain that even those who attain higher office and richer lives, will still ultimately die. "The paths of glory lead but to the arave."

The poem also makes the point that some have died far too soon, and that they may have had ambitions, talents, and desires as yet unachieved, "A heart filled with celestial fire".

The epitaph towards the end of the poem expresses another perspective on death. "The dead have escaped earthly misery, and found their home in heaven resting in God's arms." Death is thus an entry into a better life.

We may all have our own thoughts and

feelings on the difficult subject of death. During the last eighteen months it may have touched many of us, often unexpectedly during the pandemic, and we have had cause for thought and reflection, hard at times to bear.

The Queen lost her beloved husband, and demonstrated great self-restraint and dignity. Normally, his passing may have demanded a grandiose occasion, but in accordance with the law at the time, the funeral was attended by just a few people, but was moving and beautiful in its simplicity, befitting the man Prince Philip was.

After the First World War, each family who had suffered a loss in action, were given a Memorial Plaque or Death Penny as they became known. They were cast in bronze with the inscription "He/She died for Freedom and Honour". Significantly and poignantly however, they bore just a name, no rank or title of any kind. The dead were all equal in their loss and sacrifice.

Throughout the poem, Gray references a final end, which is ultimately the same, and we are all equal in the eyes of God.

To give perspective to the poem, it was written at a time when writers were thinking, exploring and speculating on aspects of death and the dying and it later continued in the Victorian era, especially after the death of Prince Albert. At the time one could purchase a book called "How to Achieve a Good Death".

This poem is not an easy read, but in the context of the time it was written it provoked thought and reflection, as did many works published at the time.

On the 14th November, we will remember the dead and those still suffering from the effects of war and conflict, with Remembrance Sunday services in both churches.

Our churches are also open during the week, for private prayer and reflection.



KILLED-IN-ACTION: 1st SEPTEMBER 1940, OFF THE DUTCH COAST, ON BOARD HMS ESK: ORDINARY SEAMAN ERNEST OPENSHAW, REMEMBERED AT ALL SAINTS CEMETERY EXTENSION IN ASCOT. BORN IN SUNDERLAND IN 1921, ERNEST WAS THE SON OF WILLIAM OPENSHAW, A BLACKSMITH'S STRIKER, AND HIS SECOND WIFE JANE HUTCHINSON OPENSHAW (NÉE JEFFERSON). I DON'T KNOW WHY THE FAMILY CAME TO ASCOT, BUT IN 1939, THE NOW WIDOWED JANE AND FOUR OF HER CHILDREN, INCLUDING ERNEST, LIVED ON FERNBANK ROAD. ERNEST WAS WORKING AS A MACHINE DRILLER IN AN AIRCRAFT FACTORY.
HE IS REMEMBERED AT THE NAVAL MEMORIAL IN SOUTHSEA NEAR PORTSMOUTH, AS PRESUMABLY HE HAS NO FORMAL BURIAL, AS HE DIED AT SEA. HE IS ALSO REMEMBERED ON HIS FAMILY PLOT IN ALL SAINTS' CEMETERY EXTENSION, ALONGSIDE HIS MOTHER JANE, HIS BROTHER WILLIAM WHO HAD ALSO BEEN KILLED IN ACTION IN MAY THE SAME YEAR, AND HIS SISTER FLORENCE MAY OPENSHAW.

THE GLOBAL MERCY ARRIVES IN EUROPE

he brand new 37,000 tonne purposebuilt hospital ship received a warm welcome as she arrived in Belgium on September 6th. It had been a long journey from her birthplace in the China State Corporation shipyard where construction, supervised by Stena RoRo of Sweden, was completed at the end

completed at the e

During her long maiden voyage, she was granted free passage through the Suez Canal. She then stopped briefly in

Malta, where she is registered, before sailing on to Antwerp. The Port Authorities have generously waived all berthing and docking fees for the next six months, while she is fitted with first class medical equipment by professional volunteers to meet the surgical needs of poor patients in Africa, who so desperately need help. She leaves for Rotterdam in March where she will be open for public tours.

She is the largest civilian fully-equipped hospital ship in the world, with six operating rooms, 200 ward beds and accommodation for over 650 volunteer crew with a multitude of skills and abilities. There are also dedicated classrooms and simulator laboratories to provide more effective

training opportunities for African doctors and nurses.

Towards the end of 2022, she will sail to Dakar in Senegal where she will take over from the 'Africa Mercy' which

will then go to Durban in South Africa for much needed maintenance.

ovember is such a busy time in the garden to prepare for winter, so I plan to share some highlights from my garden, but also arm you with a list of jobs to do this month to ensure you have things to look forward to next spring!

Passion flowers have the most incredible flowers from July to October, followed by orange fruits which whilst edible are not particularly tasty. They are rampant climbers which will quickly cover a wall or trellis and grow well in full sun. My mum grew one that filled 4 fence panels on the sunny south side of her

garden when I was small, and I recall stealing the fruits as I

went out the garden gate to play with friends. Be warned though, if they like the spot where they are, they are very difficult to eradicate, and the little fruits are full of seeds which if they drop often create lots of new plants. There is a legend of the passion flower and my mum use to tell me this story. Back in the 1600's, Spanish Christian

Missionaries explained each part of the flower with a story of the Passion of our Lord Jesus Christ: the flower is purple – the colour of the season of Lent; the five sepals

and five petals – the ten apostles present with Jesus (excluding Peter and Judas); the three stigma – the three nails that held Jesus to the cross; the five anthers – the five wounds of Jesus; the filaments – the crown of thorns; the leaves with 3 points – the Holy Trinity; the tendrils – the whips used in the flagellation; the vine – God's attachment to the earth.

I grew sunflower Evening Sun this year, the burnt orange colours have been beautiful and taken my garden into autumn. The seeds that form after have been put on the bird table to feed the birds and squirrels and I've saved a few to grow more of these next year.

My hydrangeas have also put on a stunning show this year, they are deciduous hardy shrubs, which come in a range of shapes and colours, from

large balls to cones. I also have a climbing hydrangea. My hydrangeas are mopheads and the colour of these ones are deepening into a beautiful dusky pink as they age. They prefer moist, well-drained soil, seem to grow well in this area and prefer dappled shade. My climbing hydrangea, however, does like a north facing wall. The pH of the soil will change the colour of some varieties. Now is a good time to plant hydrangeas or in the spring when the soil is warm and moist, ensure to keep well-watered during its first year. Feed in the spring with leaf mould and compost. Hydrangeas produce their flowers on old wood, so don't prune back hard in mid-spring. Old flowers left on over winter will protect new growth, cut back the flower head to just above the top set of plump buds that are forming under the dead flower head.

So, now to the jobs to get ready for winter. Start to prune apple and pear trees to control size and put grease bands round

the trunks to prevent codling moths attacking the fruits. Tidy any strawberry plants cutting of any additional runners that have formed and dead leaves. Prune dormant fruit bushes and cut down autumn fruiting raspberries down to the ground. Summer fruiting raspberries grow on the new growth produced this year so only take out the old canes and tie in the new ones. Cut down faded perennials in the flower borders and mulch, lift dahlia tubers and store them in a cool dry place if you don't want to risk losing over the winter. Keep raking up the leaves so not to damage lawns and make your own leaf mould by storing in bin bags and punch a few holes in them with a garden fork. It's still not too late to plant some tulip bulbs for spring. Send off for your seed catalogues so you can start planning for next year during the cold short days of winter.

THE LOOK CLOSER CAMPAIGN

ames Simmonds-Read, National Programme Manager at The Children's Society's Prevention programme, which runs the Look Closer campaign, said: "Predators groom children with offers of cash, gifts, drugs and alcohol, friendship and status - then use terrifying threats and violence to exploit them to carry drugs in 'county lines' operations or for sexual or labour exploitation.

"Young people may not ask for help because they have been manipulated into thinking they are making a choice, or because they are too scared to speak out. We must not hold children responsible for preventing their own exploitation, but should instead work together as a society to prevent it from happening to them".

"That's why our Look Closer Campaign highlights how important it is for people to look out for and report any signs a child is being exploited – be it in public spaces like train stations, parks, shopping centres and banks, or in online spaces like social media and gaming platforms.

"Doing so, isn't just a matter for parents and professionals. Everyone from morning commuters and transport staff, to hotel and shop workers, can play a potentially vital role in helping children to escape a situation of horrific abuse and unimaginable trauma.

"Exploited children may not always appear vulnerable, or behave in the way we would expect victims to, so it's vital, people look beyond the obvious and remember that trauma may cause young people to appear angry or aggressive'

THIS HAPPENED IN WINDSOR, BUT THE ADVICE IS USEFUL FOR EVERYONE

uesday 12 October, 2:50am, Highfield Road. Attempt to steal a Mercedes from the driveway. This was captured on video doorbell footage. Two men drove up and parked outside house. One of them approached the front door and waved a device around, probably looking for a signal from keys inside the house. The other man tried to open car doors. The owner keeps the fobs in a signal blocking pouch, so they couldn't get a signal and the car was not taken. They were wearing face masks, so could not make out faces. This is a perfect example of an attempted theft of a high value car, using a relay device. Protecting the fob, by keeping it in a 'Faraday' cage protective pouch worked – and the car was not stolen. The message is clear. If you have a high value car with a keyless fob - you must protect the fob!

Tuesday 12 October, midnight / 7am, Dedworth Road. Red Range Rover stolen from the driveway. The owner still has the keys, but they were not kept in a Faraday cage! They put the theft on Facebook and members believed the car was parked up in Stanwell. The owners went and recovered the car.

Tuesday 12 October, midnight / 4:40am, Clewer Hill Road. Keyless Range Rover Sport stolen from outside a house. The owner woke up and found the car gone. The car was tracked to the Stanwell area.

On October 8th, we held a Harvest Festival, safely, in school, to celebrate all we have in our own lives and what we can do as a school, to improve the lives and







THE QUEEN OF INSTRUMENTS: THE LUTE WITHIN OLD MASTER PAINTINGS

Adam Busiakiewicz BA MA



The lute holds a special place in the history of art: painters of the Italian Renaissance depicted goldenhaired angels plucking its delicate strings, evoking celestial harmony; in the sixteenth century, during the rise of humanism, the lute was a becoming pastime of educated courtiers, as depicted by the likes of Holbein and Titian; throughout the seventeenth century, the instrument continued to play a key role in emphasising the intimate, debauched and transient pleasures of interior scenes by Jan Steen and portraits by Frans Hals. This lecture looks at the lute, and other musical

instruments, as devices to express various aspects of the human character throughout the ages. As a part of this lecture, there will be a live music performance of faithfully reproduced solo lute music.

Adam Busiakiewicz is an Art Historian, Lecturer and Lutenist. After completing his Bachelor's Degree in History at University College London in 2010 he held the position of Head of Historical Interpretation (curator) at Warwick Castle. He left the castle in 2013 after winning a full AHRC studentship to pursue a Master's Degree in Fine and Decorative Art at the Sotheby's Institute of Art, London. He is currently finishing his doctorate in Art History at the University of Warwick. Adam is a Lecturer / Educator at the National Gallery and Guide Lecturer at the Wallace Collection, where he has organised several events and courses on Music & Art as well as other subjects. He has also given talks and performances at the Royal Collection, the Victoria and Albert Museum and the Sotheby's Institute of Art. Alongside his publications and scholarly articles, Adam is the co-editor of arthistorynews.com, one of the internet's most popular art history blogs.

PASSIONATE POTTERS FROM DE MORGAN TO LEACH

Julian Richards

William Morris led a revolution against the products of the machine age. The first of our 'passionate potters', William de Morgan, was a friend of Morris who rediscovered the secrets of Near Eastern lustre glazes. In contrast, the eccentric and argumentative Martin Brothers created a range of elaborate salt glazed pots unparalleled in their imaginative breadth. Sir Edmund Elton, the 'potter baronet', made pots which combine startling glazes with exotic forms. Finally, Bernard Leach, the father of English studio pottery, not only married the arts of Japan and England but created a legacy that is still alive today. Julian Richards' lecture explores the lives of these truly passionate potters and celebrates their extraordinary and beautiful creations.

Julian Richards studied archaeology at Reading University and has since worked as a professional archaeologist for English Heritage, for the BBC and as an independent. He was elected a fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London in 1992 and is being awarded an honorary doctorate. He has been involved in teaching and outreach projects, lecturing widely in continuing education, to groups, societies and to special interest tour companies. He researched and presented Meet the Ancestors and Blood of the Vikings for BBC2, and Mapping the Town for Radio 4. He is also the author of a number of English

Heritage publications on Stonehenge, including the previous and current guide books to the monument and landscape.






