#### THE MINISTER'S MESSAGE



#### WHAT ARE YOU EXCITED ABOUT?

et's face it! There has been a lot happening in our world and society that leave us with very little to celebrate or to be excited about. The changes around us happen so fast, and often uncomfortably. The beautiful sunny weather we have been enjoying is a reminder that our world is getting warmer, and climate change is now a harsh reality. The UK landscape always looked so beautiful with its rich green colour, but now I'm noticing dull and sad brown colours across our

fields. The sudden 'thorn in a flesh' is drought, and our reservoirs are running dry.

Another change in the landscape is our politics. For as long as I can remember, the UK boasted a clean government, with respect for the rule of law. This had been a land driven by good moral and ethical standards. A champion for human rights. A world leader in democratic reform. Compared to other countries, this is where a gap between the rich and poor had been relatively narrow. However, the soaring prices of food and energy are widening that gap, and the recent events in government leave us with many questions. It's hard to deny that the landscape is changing at a rapid rate.

Bringing it closer to home, the Ukrainian crisis means that, from day to day, we are faced with attending to the needs of those who fled the war. The question that faces us is, how do we put a smile on a person who has lost almost everything? Job, livelihood, relatives etc. How do we continue with our lives knowing someone is hurting, and on the verge of emotional and mental collapse? If we are fully sympathetic to their ordeal, then their pain and trauma will in inevitably steal our joy.

These are just a few significant factors that make us less excited about life, and I am sure you have more to add to my list. Does this mean that we have lost the ability to be happy together as a community? Not at all! I think the key to our happiness lies in the very term *'togetherness'*. My favourite African proverb teaches that *'if you want to go somewhere fast, go alone, but if you want to go far, then take a group'*. It's true! There is certainly nothing so satisfying as knowing that whatever you are going through, someone has your back. Togetherness is a safe sanctuary for any displaced soul. In fact, togetherness is the essence of what shaped Archbishop Tutu's theological model of service, *'Ubuntu'* (I am what I am because of others). The pain of others is my pain – and the joy of others, is my joy!

Talking of joy, we are all in high spirits in our parish since there will be another new member who will complete our picture of togetherness. As you may have heard, Tansley

Jordan will be joining us as our new vicar. I have met her once, and she comes across as a dynamic person, young and full of energy. Her love and prayerfulness will certainly add to our joy. I'm grateful to God that our prayers have been realised, and that we have had a successful vacancy period. If nothing makes you excited, then this is worth celebrating. Whatever the circumstance, God will always be faithful to us. As scripture says, *'he will never leave or forsake us'* (Deut 31:6). And that is exciting! For we have each other!





#### THE BEES' KNEES STEVE HEATHCOTE

Ve been keeping bees for five years now and I can highly recommend it. I'm not an expert, but I'm confident enough of the basics and there is always help and advice from the friendly local beekeeping community when needed.

Beekeeping is endlessly fascinating; it's educational, relaxing, rewarding, sometimes stressful, and occasionally very painful!

I currently have two hives at the end of my Ascot garden, and another two in a field near Chobham, courtesy of a friendly landowner who loves having bees around to pollinate her fruit trees and vegetable garden. The bees in my garden are a delight. First thing each morning whilst the kettle is boiling, I can pick up the binoculars and check that they are flying, bringing in pollen and that they generally look happy.

It is important for me to have a second 'apiary' (beekeeping site) as a contingency plan. Any complaint from my neighbours or unprovoked stings and I will ship the bees

out to the field in Chobham. Fortunately, my neighbours are very supportive and actually find the bees as fascinating as we do. It is also helpful that we have high hedges all around our garden, which means that the neighbours can have a barbecue on their patio with no bother from 100,000 stinging insects nearby. Perhaps the occasional gift of a jar of honey or beeswax candle may also help their supportiveness!

our part of the world starts in earnest in early April. Although honey bees will fly throughout the vear whenever the weather is warm enough, in April they are out foraging most days, and inside the hive the colony is growing fast as the

queen ramps up her egg-laying schedule. At this time. I inspect each hive every week. This is to check that the bees have enough food, enough space to grow into, that they are free from serious disease, that the gueen is alive, healthy and doing her job and finally to check whether or not they are preparing to swarm!

Swarming is a natural part of the honey bee lifecycle. It is the way that bees reproduce at the colony level. We beekeepers try to manage our bees so that they do not swarm. We use a variety of



methods to trick the bees into thinking that swarmed, which removes their swarming urge. This may sound

foolproof, but there is probably not a beekeeper alive that has not suffered from the occasional swarm. This is because it is very easy to miss one of the telltale signs that the bees are preparing to swarm – the presence of 'queen cells' in the hive. A aueen cell is where a new queen is being reared, and certain types of

these cells mean that it will not be long before the current gueen leaves the hive with half of the bees, to set up a new home, leaving the rest of the bees and the soon-to-hatch new queen to continue on in the old home.

I vividly remember my first swarm in the garden! One spring morning, in my first year of beekeeping, my son came to tell me that 'something was going on in the garden'. As I went outside, it sounded as though a jet engine was starting up and a huge cyclone of bees was swirling around above our heads! One of my neighbours had come out to see what was happening, and I tried to reassure him that everything

was fine, whilst secretly a feeling of helplessness and mild panic was taking hold. After a few minutes they started to congregate guickly around the gueen who had landed about 10 feet up in the neighbour's conifer tree. I quickly tried to remember all I had learnt on my 'theory of beekeeping' course and decided that I could handle this with just the help of my assistant beekeeper (aka wife). When swarming, bees are generally not dangerous as they have no nest or food stores to protect so if you are lucky enough to see this force of nature, there's no need to panic.

I climbed up a step ladder to the swarm and shook the bulk of the bees into a large cardboard box, and then brought the box down to ground level and covered it loosely with a sheet. A boxful of bees is heavier than you might imagine. Over the next few hours, the neighbours watched in fascination as the remaining bees homed in on the queen's scent and joined her in the box. That evening I decanted the bees into a spare hive and drove them off to Chobham with a huge sense of relief and satisfaction. SPOT THE QUEEN!





These days I like to think that I'm less likely to suffer a similar swarming and I'm far more confident about what to do if I'm wrona!

As you read this, I am preparing for the messiest, stickiest time of the beekeeping year. It is time for the honey harvest! On one hectic weekend in mid-August, I will take the excess honey off the hives and turn our kitchen into a sterilised food-processing factory. Each comb of honev has the wax 'cappings' removed, and then the honey is spun out using an electric centrifuge. It's then filtered to remove bits of wax, bee's legs, bees knees etc! then left to settle before transferring

to jars a few days later. It's the best honey I've ever tasted – but then perhaps I am a little bit biased.

The autumn is all about preparing for winter: treating the bees for mites, ensuring they have enough food to survive and perhaps combining weaker colonies with stronger ones as the bee numbers reduce. In winter the bees don't hibernate, but huddle together in the hive eating honey, leaving only for short flights if the weather is warm enough. Then comes spring, and the excitement starts again. I can't wait!

POLICE NEWS FROM THE BEAT 

#### A NEW TYPE OF FRAUD

n elderly victim received a call on 16th July, from an unknown number. The caller said that the victim's son had dropped his phone down the toilet and it couldn't now be used and in future if he wanted to make contact he should use a new number for him. Soon after, he started to receive text messages, purportedly from his son, saying he was being threatened and needed money immediately. So far he has transferred almost £5,000

He has now been in contact with his son who has confirmed it is all a scam!

#### **BIKE SECURITY**

ombination locks are a complete waste of time. The lock can easily be broken if the bike is jerked sharply. Thieves know this and have perfected the movement, so that it is not so obvious. To a passing member of the public, it just looks like the bike got stuck and the owner had to jerk it fr<u>ee!</u>

Cutting the chain or D-Lock is simple and again, can be done in front of the public, who will be totally unaware of what is happening. Thieves have a back pack, which they lay across the bike. They then appear to be rummaging in the backpack looking for something. In fact, the only thing in the backpack is a large pair of bolt croppers,



capable of cutting though almost any chains / D-locks. There is a hole in the bottom of the backpack and they simply put the bolt croppers though the hole, cut the chain, which drops to the floor. They put the backpack back on and ride away!



It is really that simple. SO - the advice is to place the locks, where this would be more difficult and visible, as well as using several locks - all in very visible places, so they cannot do this.

The other thing to remember – is how few people actually record the make, model and frame number of their bike.

We encourage all bike owners to put their bike up against a wall and photograph it, then turn it over and photograph the frame number, which is on the underside. between the pedals. Then email the photos to themselves, so that they always have them readily to hand if the bike is stolen.

The Windsor and Maidenhead Bike clubs. hold regular bike marking sessions and we also encourage people to mark their bikes themselves and register them with either Bike Register or Immobilise - the government site, where you can register any valuables.

#### **POETRY CORNER**

Since writing the July/August Poetry Page, I have moved, not far, but within the same building, but it may as well have been to Timbuktu. I am therefore sans my two bookcases of poetry/reference books, which are still packed safely away in boxes. So I am resolved to writing about the one poetry book which escaped, *The Mersey Sound*, poetry by the Liverpudlian poets, Adrian Henri, Roger McGough and Brian Patten. It was first published in the Swinging Sixties and remains a best seller to this day. I have to advise readers some of the poems are too risqué for a church magazine, so I will be carefully selective, while trying not to offend the reader, but perhaps leaving you wanting more and wanting to read on!!

To begin, Adrian Henri, not only a talented poet, but artist, performer and librettist. His philosophy was 'If you think you can do it and you want to do it – then do it! He died in 2000 following complications after a stroke. Of the three poets he is my favourite, his poetry is less melancholy and serious than McGough and Patten. One of his most popular poems is titled 'Love Is' and like much of his poetry it is rhythmic by the use of repetition.

Love is the presents in Christmas shops, Love is when you're feeling Top of the Pops, Love is what happens when the music stops, Love is.

Love is you and Love is me,

Love is a prison and Love is free, Love is what's there when you are away from me, Love is.

And his shorter, anecdotal poems, 'Drinking Song':

He became more and more drunk, As the afternoon wore off! Song for a Beautiful Girl Petrol Pump Attendant on the motorway. I wanted your soft verges, But you gave me the hard shoulder!

and Poem for Roger McGough.

A man in a supermarket, Standing in the queue, Wondering what it's like, To buy groceries for two.

This will explain itself as you read on. Roger McGough sang with the pop group The Scaffold in the 1960s and had a number one hit with *Lily the Pink*. He writes poetry for both adults and children and received a CBE in 2004 for his services to Literature. He is the presenter of Poetry Please on Radio4. His poetry varies in many ways, amusing, confrontational, political and reflective.

Vinegar. sometimes I feel like a priest in a fish and chip queue quietly thinking as the vinegar runs through how nice it would be to buy supper for two.

or by contrast, M66

The politicians (who are buying huge cars with hobnailed wheels the size of merry-go-rounds) have a new plan. They are going to put cobbles in our eye sockets and pebbles in our navels and fill us up with asphalt and lay us side by side so that we can take a more active part in the road to destruction.

And, finally, Brian Patten. The majority of his poems in this anthology were written in his teenage years. I love his poetry for children for example, *Gargling with Jelly and Juggling with Gerbils*! In 2001 he was awarded the Freedom of the City of Liverpool. I conclude with just one of his poems.

A Talk with a Wood. Moving through you one evening when you offered shelter to quiet things soaked in rain. I saw through your thinning branches the beginnings of suburbs, and frightened by the rain, grey hares running upright in distant fields: and quite alone there I thought of nothing but my footprints being filled, and love, distilled of people, drifted free, then the woods spoke with me.

If you grew up in the 1960s, as I did, this poetry book certainly reflects the time it was written in and the style of poetry at the time. It is not for everyone but it entertains, makes you think and is a typical reflection of life and love in the Sixties, very different to the way we think and act now.







**A BIT OF HISTORY** 

An extract form a Book entitled *"The Book"* of Sunninghill and Ascot" by C W Searle, JP and published in 1937. Kindly donated by James Mason of The Ascot Arts Society. Talking about the history of St Michael & All Angel's Church: "MUSIC AND ITS CHARMS":

**CC** efore 1861, the instrumental music of the church was produced from a barrel-organ which had its place with the school children in the west end gallery. This organ had a limited repertoire – it was restricted to 6 or 8 tunes, and from these the

organist had to select his recital programmes, his opening and closing voluntaries, and the festival anthems. Poor fellow! He turned the handle and the barrels did the rest. James Dunster was his name and he was the estate carpenter at Sunninghill Park. Between 1830 and 1845 or thereabouts he lived at the Thatched Cottage. Cheapside. He was a Wesleyan and attended the evening services at the Weslevan Chapel after turning the handle of his instrument at matins and early evensong at the parish church. In 1861, Miss Hargreaves, a parishioner, created a mild sensation by offering to play a keyboard instrument which she would provide. Some of the parishioners acclaimed the idea of the change-over from handle to keyboard; others feared that if the organ was installed the lady might take unto herself a husband or leave the neighbourhood and then, whatever would happen to the music of the church! Anyhow. Miss Hargreaves charmed away all opposition to her proposal

and, when the organ came, she charmed the congregation with her playing. Whether the lady fell victim to matrimony or left the neighbourhood, we cannot say, but we know that she was followed on the organ stool by a young gentleman named Potter who, in turn was followed by Mr G J Francis who died in 1936. It is to be added that Mr Francis was paid a salary of £30 per annum and, for a few years he had to supplement his income by taking up another appointment other than musical."

#### **A VIEW FROM THE GARDEN**

s predicted, we did end up with a glut of courgettes, so they have been shared with neighbours! The heatwave seems to have slowed them down a little, but the next harvest is on its way, my favourite are yellow courgettes. I also tried some round courgettes this year which are not only attractive in the vegetable plot but have grown very well and taste good. The runner beans have made good progress and are in flower and we have started to harvest both runner beans and French round beans. I plan to steam them and then toss in hot olive oil, a little butter and some garlic to serve. The tomato plants have been highly successful, again some being given to friends and neighbours. I recently prepared a dish of cherry tomatoes halved and left at room temperature, dressed with plenty of

extra virgin olive oil and sprinkled with lemon thyme and sea salt. Ensure you keep feeding your plants with tomato plant food to ensure healthy crops. I've also noted that some of my beetroots are ready to harvest so I shall pulling some of those this week. I then boil them to remove the skins and eat in salads. You can also grate them raw into

salads (but wear gloves or you'll have pink fingers) and they also taste good roasted. A friend gave me some aubergine plants and I've included a photo of one of the flowers as they are so pretty. I planted 3 plants in a large pot, the plants are now quite big and I can see lots of flowers but no fruit yet. Aubergines are of the nightshade family, *Solanaceae* and are related to tomatoes, chilli peppers and the potato. I've also harvested some cucumbers which taste so different from shop bought ones!

We have just returned from a holiday in Greece and I came across this very pretty flower whilst there and have now carried out the research to find out what it is. It's called a Sea Daffodil, *Pancratium maritimum* and is a species of bulbous plant native to the Canary Islands and of the Amaryllis family. It has large white fragrant flowers which just lasted a day and were all over the beach so are appropriately named.

This is a repeat flowering climbing rose I received with another white rose free from a newspaper many years ago. I can't find the names of them but recall they had something to do with the Queen Mother and feel they were in remembrance. They both seem to be disease resistant and were fed earlier in the year with a rose fertiliser. I've also included a photo of a damask rose which is a tall shrub and has an abundance of highly fragrant pale pink flowers. I deadhead my roses after

flowering to encourage more flowers.

This single flowered dahlia has dark almost black foliage which really sets of the bright pink flowers; I'm unable to tell you the name as it came in a mixed pack of seeds which I grew it from last year. I also took the chance and left it in the ground rather than lifting it and it has survived. Single flowers are more open to pollinators and the bees

seem to like it. I also grew this rather unusual black-faced pansy from seed and it is now self-seeding which I'm pleased about.


